1. What is the main purpose of the Policy, Strategy or Function?

The purpose of this function is to identify the specific issues affecting neighbourhoods across the district which have been identified as being in need of support from the Community Safety and Development Team. Areas of need are identified by a variety of internal and external sources including; Multi Agency Joint Action Groups (JAGs), Number of calls to Braintree District Council, Referrals from Prevention and Education Officers (BDC) and Police Anti Social Behaviour Officers, Issues raised by residents at community meetings, Neighbourhood Action Panel meetings, Neighbourhood watch co-ordinator referrals and cases raised at the Local Area Committees.

The consultations are then used by resident groups supported by BDC Community Safety and Development Officers to develop and action plan for their area to deliver Community Led Solutions to the specific issues affecting where they live.

Open consultations are also held to coincide with the annual Community Wellbeing Days held in September/October in the three main towns. The results of these consultations and the neighbourhood specific activities are combined and used as part the statutory requirement of public consultation on priorities for the Braintree District Community Safety Partnership (CSP) in the Annual Strategic Assessment.

These activities are delivered and led by Braintree District Council's Community Safety and Development Team in partnership with a variety of local community groups and other agencies operating in areas of need. The specific partners will change dependent on the area where the consultation is taking place and the purpose for the consultation.

This project is open to all members of the community within specific areas of the district which have been identified as in need of support from the Community Safety and Development Team, as well as general consultations undertaken as part of the Annual Strategic Assessment of the CSP.
